


Initial Scoping Plan

- Outlines State's strategy to achieve 2020 GHG limit
- Built on a balanced mix of strategies
- Required by AB 32



AB 32 Scoping Plan Update

- Builds upon successful framework established by initial Scoping Plan
- Shows progress to steadily drive down GHG emissions to 2020 limit
- Describes actions California must undertake to move beyond 2020
- Identifies need for establishing a statewide mid-term GHG emissions target



AB 32 Scoping Plan Update

Process

- Discussion Draft
 - Released for public comment October 1, 2013
 - Presented at October 24, 2013, Board meeting
- Proposed Update
 - Released for public comment February 10, 2014
 - Presented at February 20, 2014
- Final Proposed Update
 - Reflects input from stakeholders and Board direction
 - Released for public comment May 15, 2014

Key Differences Between Proposed Update and Final Update

- Provided approach to assessing the effects of AB 32 programs on disadvantaged communities
 - Multi phase approach
 - Aligned with Adaptive Management process
- Provided more details on SB 535 implementation process
 - Quantifying and reporting on benefits to disadvantaged communities
- Updated emissions inventory discussion
 - 2012 statewide data
 - UC Berkeley's forests and other natural lands report
- Added more recent findings on climate science

Environmental Analysis

- Draft Environmental Analysis (EA) released for 45-day public review and comment on March 14, 2014
- Final EA and written responses to comments received on EA released on May 15, 2014

Staff Proposal for Board Consideration

- Written responses to comments received on the EA and the environmental findings
- First Update to the Climate Change Scoping Plan

Putting the Plan into Action

- Develop near-term measures identified in Update
- Develop economic analysis plan by end of 2014
- Develop SLCP Strategy by 2015
- Convene interagency workgroups called for in sector recommendations
- Continue consultation with experts
