Baseline CO2 per capita: 22.4 (2005); 21.5-20.6 (2020); 19.6-18.5 (2035) [jason--this is emfac2007-estimated ghg from said pass veh's, without any adjustment for pavley or lcf...again least-to-most ambitious]
