Dear Chair Nichols and Air Resources Board Members,

Thank you for the opportunity to comment on the Draft Funding Guidelines for Agencies that Administer California Climate Investments.

California's state-certified community ("local") conservation corps provide job training and workforce development opportunities to residents of disadvantaged communities and others, such as at-risk youth and veterans, who face barriers to employment. We've attached additional information on our program and offer the following suggestions for strengthening the guidelines to benefit the populations we serve:

<u>Require programs and projects to demonstrate job training and</u> <u>workforce development benefits.</u>

- 1. The state's climate laws seek to maximize jobs and job training opportunities. The guidelines are an opportunity to require that "the services of statecertified community conservation corps or other nonprofit workforce development program that serves residents of disadvantaged communities and those facing barriers to employment shall be used whenever feasible."
- 2. For grant programs, ARB should direct administering agencies to prioritize projects that "use the services of state-certified community conservation corps or other nonprofit workforce development program that serves residents of disadvantaged communities or those facing barriers to employment."
- 3. At Table 2-2, "Illustrative Examples of Common Needs

Increase job readiness and career opportunities (e.g., <u>state-certified community conservation corps or other</u> workforce development programs <u>that serve residents of</u> <u>disadvantaged communities or those facing barriers to</u> <u>employment</u>, on-the-job training, industry-recognized certifications).

California's state-certified community conservation corps are ready to help ensure that funds provide strong environmental benefits to all communities <u>and</u> provide lasting job training and employment opportunities to the most vulnerable residents of our state.

Editing the guidelines to reflect a more robust job training and workforce development component would better uphold the state's climate laws and would ensure that those facing obstacles to employment don't miss a needed opportunity.
