

In California in 2002



This chart comes from the EPA.

Please note the 178,690 tons of PM2 that are generated each year by factors other than On Road vehicles.

Now please tell all of our concerned citizens, including each of us, that even if you completely eliminated all On Road diesel engines you will only reduce PM2 by 12,370 tons per year. This is pale in comparison to the 178,690 tons produced elsewhere.

Praise goes to all the people, including each of us, for wanting cleaner air. But it is just irresponsible to spend so much money on something that isn't going to make that much of a difference.

Please tell all the proponents of this truck rule that the trucking industry also wants clean air. None of us are arguing that point. The people pushing for this regulation simply seem to be un-informed of the cost they are wanting to impose on this industry for something that is not going to net much of a result. I think if they were aware of this they would tend to see our side of it.
