Re: Two day meeting January 25 and 26, 2007

PLEASE be aware that there are two (2) dry-cleaning conventions scheduled soon this year. The first is the Federation of Korean Dry-cleaning Associations show at Anaheim on March 24-25, 2007 and the National Clean Show in Las Vegas on June 10-14, 2007.

If the board's final recommendation is to steer perc out of the industry, then you owe it to all concerned to be straightforward and timely with your conclusions.

The most disturbing line in your proposal is under 'Description of Alternatives' on page 3. I quote "Since one common solvent that could be used in place of perc causes the release of smog-forming emissions, the Board could also prohibit the use of machines that emit smog-forming emissions as a mitigating action associated with restricting the use of perc."

Well, ladies and gentleman, you just knocked out petroleum as an alternative and wiped out about 95% of our selections in new dry-cleaning machines.

With global warming becoming your new mantra, wouldn't it be something if you end up banning the one solvent that contributes the least to the greenhouse effect.
