

California Health & Safety Code Requirements

- § 39657 Requires ARB to identify toxic air contaminants; identify minimum threshold levels
- § 39658 Requires ARB to develop Airborne Toxic Control Measures (ATCMs)
- § 39666 For compounds with no threshold level, the HSC requires control measures to be based on <u>best</u> <u>available control technology</u>, or more effective controls in consideration of costs and risk

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Formaldehyde as Toxic Air Contaminant

- Identified as a Toxic Air Contaminant in 1992
- No level of exposure considered "safe"
 - Damages DNA
- Inhalation causes cancer in the region of the throat behind the nose
- Non-cancer effects

Key Elements of the ATCM

- Establishes new formaldehyde emission limits for HWPW, PB, and MDF panels, and requires their use in finished goods
- Panel manufacturers must demonstrate compliance through third party certification
- Fabricators must use compliant products in their finished goods for California
- Retailers must only obtain compliant products for sale to the California public

Manufactured Product Labeling

- Manufacturer name
- Lot or batch number
- Marking to denote P1, P2, NAF, or ULEF
- CARB TPC number

Third Party Certification Responsibilities

- Manufacturer quality assurance verification
- Help develop target operating limits
- Independent inspections and audits
- Use primary or secondary test methods certification testing
- Maintain records
 - Manufacturers they represent
 - Results of inspections and audits
 - List of certified laboratories and large chambers used
 - Correlations between small and large chamber tests
 - ARB executive order
- Annual report to CARB

- §93120.6 & §93120.5
 - (a) Emission limits for HWPW, PB, and MDF
 - (b) Additional Requirements
 - (c) Product Labeling
 - (d) Statement of Compliance
 - (e) Facility Inspections
- §93120.12 -- Appendix 1 (c), (b) Sell-through provisions

Additional Requirements

- (b) Importers/distributors must take reasonable prudent precautions to ensure that complying composite wood products and finished goods are purchased
- In addition, importers/distributors must keep records showing the date of purchase and the supplier... in electronic or hard copy form for a minimum of two years...

Imported Product Labeling

- (c) (1)&(2) If the composite wood products and/or finished goods are not modified by the importers/distributors, no additional labeling is required.
- If the composite wood products and/or finished goods are modified, importers/distributors are subject to the labeling requirements specified for fabricators in section 93120.7(d).

Statement of Compliance

 (d)The importers/distributors must state on the bill of lading or invoice, that the composite wood products or composite wood products contained in finished goods comply with the applicable Phase 1 or Phase 2 emission standard.

Facility Inspections



(e) ... Importers/distributors may be inspected by ARB... In the course of an inspection, ARB... may request to audit records or secure samples for testing...

Sell-through Provisions

- Allows sale of non-compliant products manufactured prior to standard effective dates
- Distributors

HWPW, PB, MDF panels: 5 months

Finished goods: 18 months

Importers

HWPW, PB, MDF panels: 3 months

Finished goods: 18 months

Rulemaking Status

- CARB approved ATCM on April 26, 2007
- ATCM modifications for public comment on January 31, 2008
- Completed Final Statement of Reason
- Submit rulemaking file to OAL by March 7, 2008
- OAL approval and codification into California
 Code of Regulations by late April, 2008

Reasonable Prudent Precaution

Mandate for supply chain management Provides additional assurance of emissions compliance

Recordkeeping

Links all products in commerce to qualifying emissions tests

Labeling

Enhances field enforcement

Facility Inspections

Allow for auditing Allow for test sample collection

Field-screening


FLEC Chamber/Interscan portable testing device Initial tests underway with DPH

- Laboratory test methods
 - Raw boards -> Sample handling and testing protocol under development with DPH
 - Finished goods -> Initiate sample preparation & testing protocol development in April
- FAQ's

Third Party Certification Program

- International TPC services are essential
- TPC application under development; will be posted for public comment on CARB website in March, 2008
- Calls and meetings
 TPC focused webinar in Spring 2008
- List of approved TPC to be posted on CARB website in April, 2008 (~10-15 potential initial applicants)

NAF and ULEF Applications

- Application and administration process under development
- Approvals case by case
- Exempts manufacturers who use NAF and certain ULEF resins from TPC
- Applications will require emissions data from approved TPC
 - Mills may work with candidate TPC's

- Enforcement of non-IWPA products Level playing field
- Chain of custody documentation

July-Sept 2008	 Complete finished product enforcement testing protocol NAF/ULEF applications and review
October-December 2008	 Enforcement preparations Enforcement test protocol "test-runs"
